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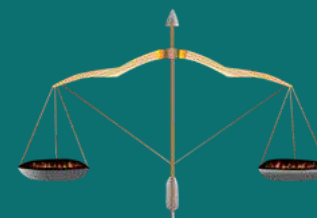

WHAT IS RESTORATIVE JUSTICE?

Restorative justice is about solving problems, working on relationships, and healing. Instead of just giving a punishment, people talk about what happened, how it made them feel, and then work together to find an answer that makes everyone feel better. It's about understanding each other and finding a fair way to fix things.

WHAT WAS THIS MEETING FOR?

This was your first meeting to join the Restorative Justice Program with TI. Your Caseworker will contact you soon to tell you about the first meeting with your facilitators.

WHAT IS A FACILITATOR?

A facilitator is someone who makes it easier for people to talk about what happened, what led up to the charge, and how to move forward. It is important to be open and honest with them about what happened so they can give you the proper tools and resources to do well in the program.



WHAT IS THE IKAJURIALATTIT RJ COMMITTEE?

The Committee is made up of a group of people in Ottawa who volunteer their time to make sure Inuit have the chance to deal with conflict following the 8 guiding principles of Inuit Qaujimajatuqangit. They are also facilitators for the program.

WHAT DOES THE CASEWORKER DO?

Your Caseworker's job is to keep in touch with you and help you through this process. They will remind you of appointments, what is expected of you at each stage, and can answer any questions or issues you may have. They can also connect you to any support or resources, such as housing, Ontario Works, ID, and so on.

WHAT ARE THE FORMS I SIGNED?

You signed some consent forms for the program. Consent means that you agreed to be part of this process and you understand what is happening. You consented to four main things:

- To participate in this voluntary program
- Taking responsibility for your actions
- Give consent to the Caseworker to contact any program you are involved in.
- You will stay in contact with the Caseworker or Liaison and reply to all messages and calls.



HOW LONG IS THE PROCESS?

It is different for each person. The best way to graduate from the program is to make sure you are talking to the Caseworker and facilitators, and going to all appointments made.
